Trade Booth One

Haitian Produce

Agricultural production in Haiti represents 30% of GDP and employs 50% of the work force.

Currently the farms are mostly dedicated to subsistence farming. However, investment opportunities in the agricultural sector show promise due to the quality of the available arable land, experienced labor force, and amazing recovery of production after the earthquake in 2010 and Hurricane Matthew 2016.

Land on the plains has the advantage of being located adjacent to the sea, making it easier to access international markets.

Haiti: Top Exporter of Mangoes in The Caribbean Region.

•Haiti is able to produce mangoes almost all year round in different regions of the island thanks to its diversity of microclimates:

Mango Production Calendar

- ***** Leogane: October December
- ***** Le Plaine de Cul de Sac: November February
- * Arcahaie and Cabaret: January March
- * Artibonite: April June
- Central Plateau: May June
- Gros Morne Port-de-Paix: June September

With over 140 varieties of mangos, it is estimated that Haiti is only exporting 20% of its potential output despite the high demand on the international market.

As a result, it has attracted a company like *Coca Cola* to choose Haiti's mango juice for its products.





Cacao

 Haiti's cacao is known to be of the best qualities in the world. It is grown in the northern and southern part of the country by an estimated 20,000 independent producers.



- The Northern region includes Grande Riviere du Nord, Acul du Nord, Port Margot, Borne (Ti bourg) St-Raphael, Dondon and Milot
- The Grande-Anse covers Dame-Marie, Chambellan, Ansed'Hailnaut, Moron, and Marfranc with Petit Bourg in the north and Dame-Marie.
- National production has been estimated to be 4,500 metric tonnes in 2009 of which 3800 metric tonnes are exported via only two distributors, Novella and Wieners

- (ii) named as Traders under Standard Trading Terms and Conditions
- (iii) authorized to trade the commodity(s) owned by the Trader.
- (iv) entitled, solely by reason of stock ownership, to occupy a Trade Booth in one or more of the Commodities.
- (v) principal to a proprietary lease for a Trade Booth owned by the Exchange."
